

## CONFECTIONER TROLLINGER DIES, AGED 66

Widely Known Wholesaler Succumbs to Pneumonia After 2 Days

NATIVE OF FORGEDALE;  
MOVED HERE IN 1889

Learned Trade Under Late W. S. Rhoads and George Schwab

Ill only two days, George K. Trollinger, 66, widely known confectioner, died yesterday morning in his home, 313 North Evans street.

Death was attributed to pneumonia which he contracted early Tuesday morning. He had complained of feeling ill shortly after 3 o'clock Tuesday morning and was unable to leave his bed at his usual rising hour.

Mr. Trollinger was born in Forgedale, near Barto, in 1868 and came to Pottstown in 1889. He took up his residence on North Evans street, in the residence adjoining his late home.

He gained his early experience in the confectionery trade as a clerk in a grocery store. Upon moving to Pottstown he entered the employ of the late W. S. Rhoads, then operating a candy business.

#### Opens Own Business

Later he was employed by George Schwab in the confectionery business. He left Schwab in 1909 to start his own business at his home on North Evans street.

Starting with only a few customers, Mr. Trollinger built up the wholesale trade until it grew to be one of the largest confectionery businesses operated by an individual in this section.

Mr. Trollinger was a son of the late Abraham and Elizabeth Trollinger. He is survived by his widow, Susan E. and four children, Wayne, 307 North Evans street; Eva, wife of W. K. Slonaker, 331 Jefferson avenue; Russell, 1247 Queen street and George Jr., 173 North York street. Nine grandchildren, a brother, Morris Trollinger, 557 Jefferson avenue and a sister, Emma, widow of William Fizz, 755 Walnut street, also survive.

#### To Be Buried Monday

The late confectioner was a member of the Masonic order, Fraternal Order of Eagles, Knights of the Golden Eagles, Empire Hook and Ladder company and the West End Fire company.

Funeral services will be conducted Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in his late residence. Interment will be made in Pottstown cemetery under supervision of Funeral Directors H. R. Houck and Son.
